School Profile Academic Year 2020/2021

- ❖ Littlebourne CEP school is a mixed-form entry mainstream school.
- ❖ Pupils are aged 4-11 years.
- ❖ The proportion of the whole school population who have special educational needs or disabilities (SEN/D) and are identified on 'SEN with Support' for the academic year 2020/2021 was 18 children. This is 17% of children on the school roll.
- ❖ The proportion of the whole school population who have an education, health and care plan (EHCP) is 1% (1 child).

Please note - Some aspects of the original report have been removed to preserve anonymity of our pupils due to the size of our school.



SEN Areas of Need: SEN Support and EHCP

Total SEN/D across the school is 17.0% (National figure is 12.2% -January 2021)

- ❖ The most commonly identified area of need from the SEN/D Code of Practice (DfE/DoH, 2015) is Communication and Interaction, including speech and language difficulties and Autism Spectrum Condition (ASC). This area of need represents 55.6% of the 'SEN with Support' population.
- ❖ Cognition and Learning represents 22.2% of the 'SEN with Support' population. This includes children with complex, moderate or specific learning difficulties such as Dyslexia or Dyscalculia.
- ❖ We currently have 1 child with Physical and Sensory needs.

Each class has children placed at a monitoring level, who may also need support or have a specific diagnosis. Children at monitoring level will have their needs provided for through Quality First Teaching strategies using the Mainstream Core Standards guidance from the Local Authority Kent County Council. They may also participate in some targeted support. In the academic year 2020/21 there were 17 children at monitoring level across the school.

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The tables below only reflect children placed at 'SEN with Support', requiring over and above provision in order to access the curriculum and/or make academic and/or social progress. It demonstrates that the majority of need identified at Littlebourne is within Communication and Interaction - 55.6% of 'SEN with Support' and 9.4% of the school population. The next highest category of need is Cognition and Learning - 22.2% of 'SEN with Support' and 3.8% of the school population.

Children are identified through a variety of in school processes including different types of assessment throughout the year, knowledge of the child and family circumstances, observations and discussions at termly Pupil Progress Meetings



Update on the School's Implementation of SEN/D Processes

Support for pupils with SEN/D or additional requirements:

Provision in School

- ❖ External services continued to support children through Relax Kids (24 children) and Play Therapy (2 children) although this was disrupted due to National Schools Lockdown.
- ❖ During the second National Schools Lockdown, children identified with SEN/D or additional requirements were offered places in school, if required. 6 children came into school on at least one day during the week. The remaining children learnt at home supported by class teachers.
- ❖ Covid-19 restrictions and National Schools Lockdowns have impacted upon the way that some interventions have been able to take place e.g. across class support/ interventions.

Cycles of the graduated approach

SEN/D provision within the school has seen numerous changes in the academic year 2020/2021:

- ❖ New SENCO has implemented revised Class Provision Maps in Term 5, following rigorous staff training covering Terms 4 and 5
- ❖ New Class Provision Maps identify interventions related to areas of need
- ❖ New Class Provision Maps utilise SMART (Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Realistic, Timely) Targets and these are assessed against entry and exit data
- ❖ Termly Pupil Progress Review Meetings occur with Headteacher, SENCO and class teachers to discuss the progress of children and any concerns. The focus of the children varies termly but could include all children, Pupil Premium children and other specific groups. At every meeting children identified as 'SEN with Support' are discussed.

Canterbury Specialist Teaching and Learning Service (STLS)

- ❖ 5 children are currently being supported by Canterbury Specialist Teaching and Learning Service (STLS). 4 children are being supported under Communication & Interaction. 1 child under Cognition & Learning.
- ❖ 1 child due to start Reception in September is already under STLS for Communication & Interaction difficulties.
- ❖ Most visits for these children have been virtual for 2020/2021, due to the COVID-19 Pandemic.

Canterbury Christian Schools Work Trust (CCSWT)

- ❖ 3 children accessed mentoring services with a CCSWT primary school worker.

Relax Kids

- ❖ 24 children accessed Relax Kids with an external trained Relax Kids practitioner to learn relaxation techniques

Play Therapy

- ❖ 2 children were supported by an external Play Therapist.

Rising Sun (Domestic Violence & Abuse Service)

- ❖ 1 child accessed support from Rising Sun.
