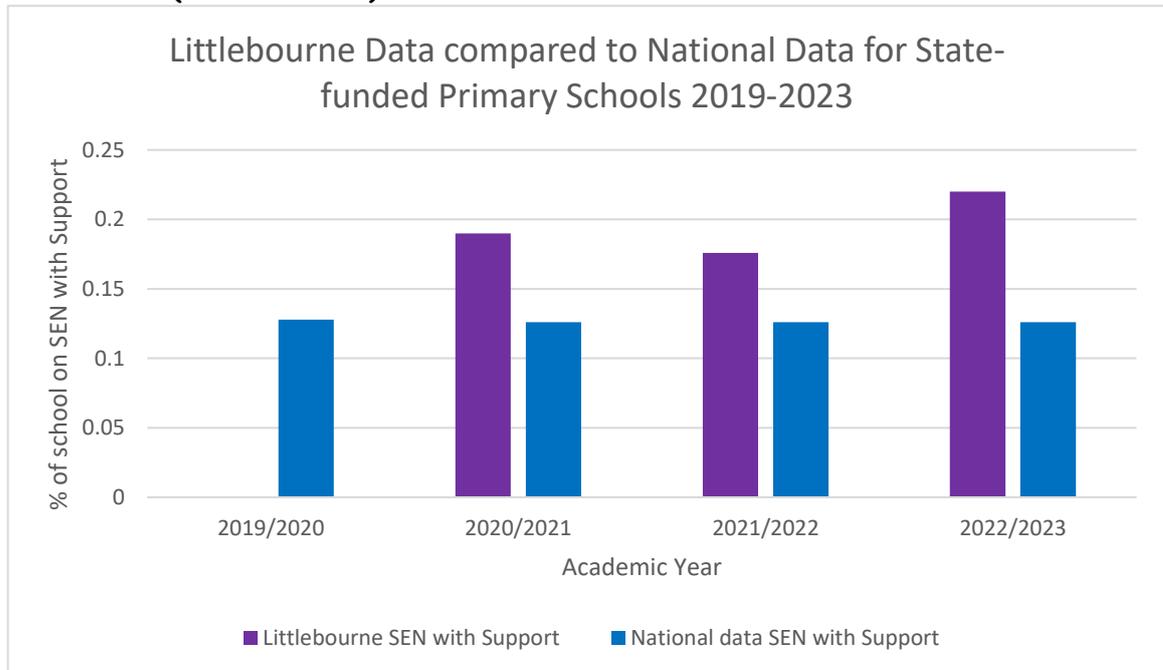
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The information and data in this report relates to the academic year 2022/23

School Profile Academic Year 2022/2023

- ❖ Littlebourne CEP school is a mixed-form entry mainstream school.
- ❖ Pupils are aged 4-11 years.
- ❖ The proportion of the whole school population who have special educational needs or disabilities (SEN/D) and were identified on 'SEN with Support' for the academic year 2022/2023 was 22 children. This was 22.0% of children on the school roll (100 children).

- ❖ The proportion of the whole school population who had an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) in September 2022 was 3% (3 children).
- ❖ The proportion of the whole school population who had an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) in July 2023 was 3% (3 children). This is below the National figure for EHCPs in school, which sits at 4.3% (June 2023).

SEN Areas of Need: SEN Support and EHCP

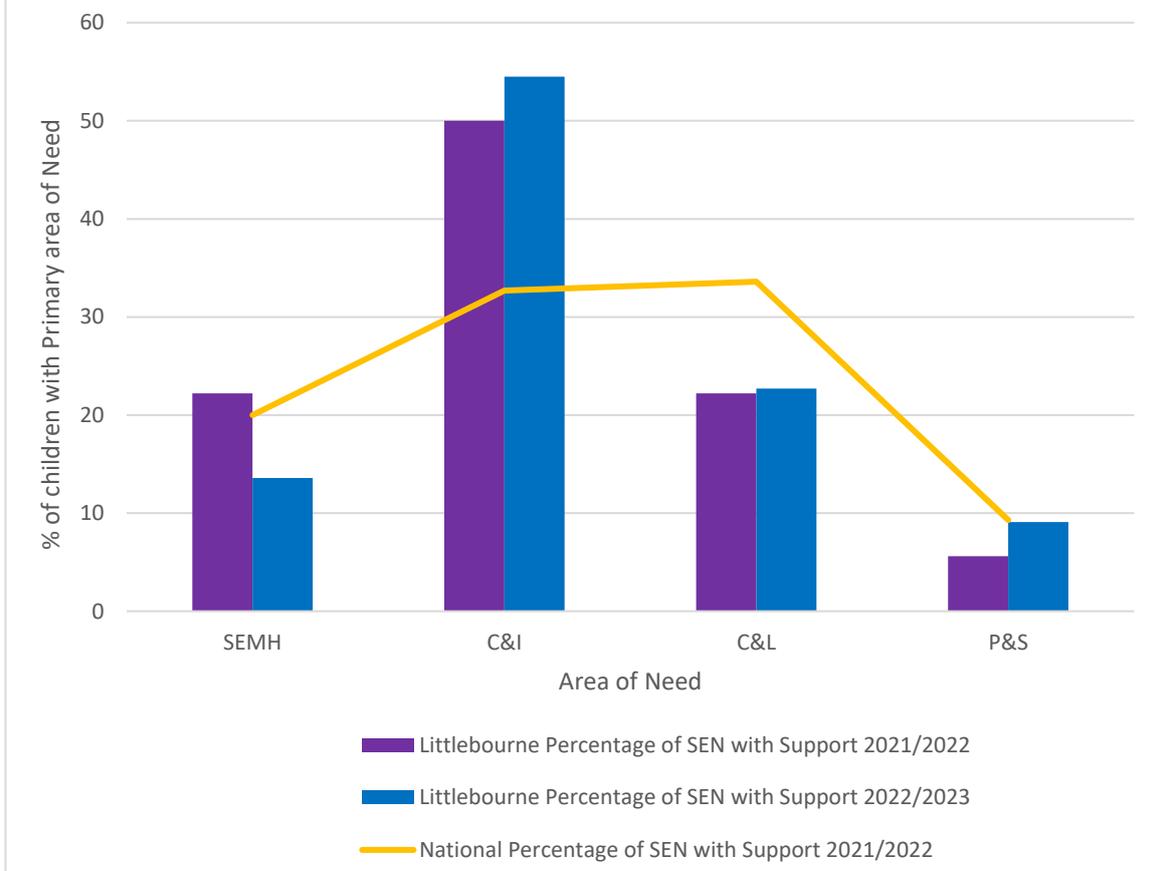
Total SEN/D across the school was 22% (National figure is 13% -June 2023)

The most commonly identified primary area of need from the SEN/D Code of Practice (DfE/DoH, 2015) of children identified on SEN with Support at Littlebourne is Communication and Interaction; 52.4%. This is above the national average of 32.7%. Communication and Interaction, includes both speech and language difficulties and Autism Spectrum Condition (ASC).

- ❖ Cognition and Learning is the second most prominent primary area of need identified for children identified as 'SEN with Support'. This includes children with complex, moderate or specific learning difficulties such as Dyslexia or Dyscalculia. This is below national figures.
- ❖ Social, Emotional and Mental Health difficulties represent 13.6% of the primary area of need for children identified on 'SEN with Support'. This includes children with difficulties such as ADHD, Anxiety or depression. This is below national figures.
- ❖ Physical and Sensory needs are the least prevalent primary area of need at Littlebourne and sit just below national average.

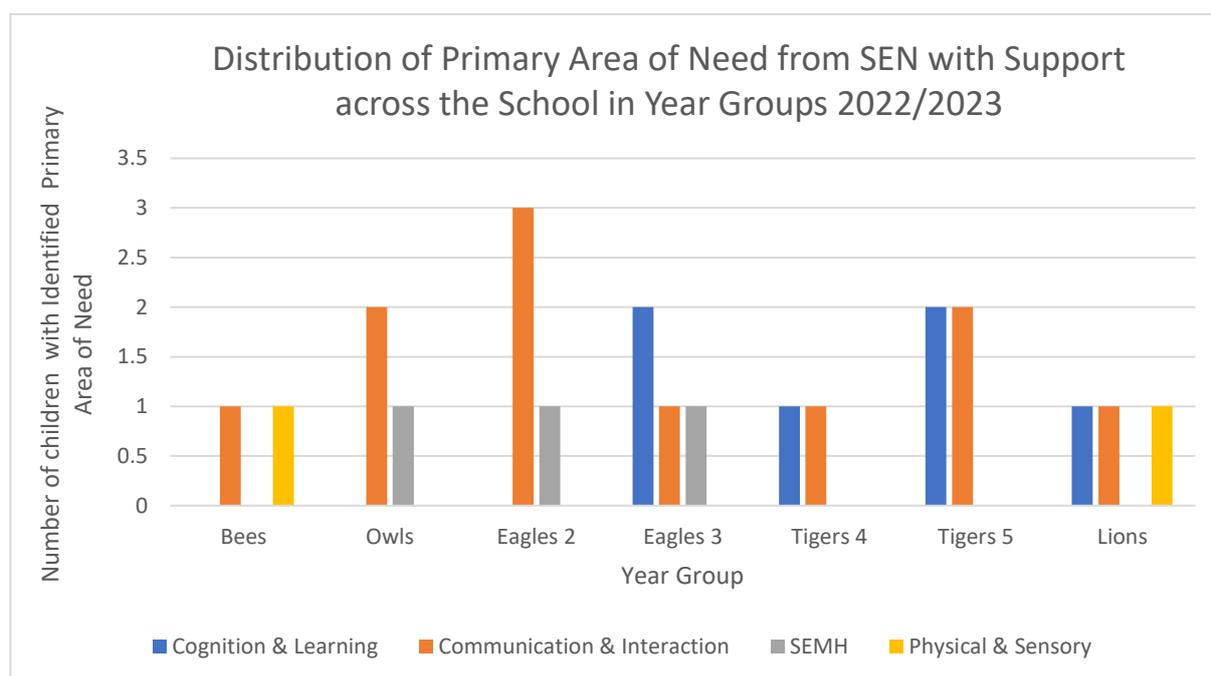
Littlebourne Primary Areas of Need on SEN with Support compared to National Primary Areas of Need 2021/2022 to 2022/2023



Over the past 2 academic years following COVID the areas of need presented at Littlebourne have changed. The post-COVID SEMH increase has settled in line with developments across the school in wellbeing provision and nurturing approaches across the school. Cognition and Learning has shown a small increase due to more effective data collection and monitoring processes, but is still below national average. Communication and Interaction continues to increase as the primary area of need following the disruption of School Closures. Littlebourne remains above national average in this area of need.

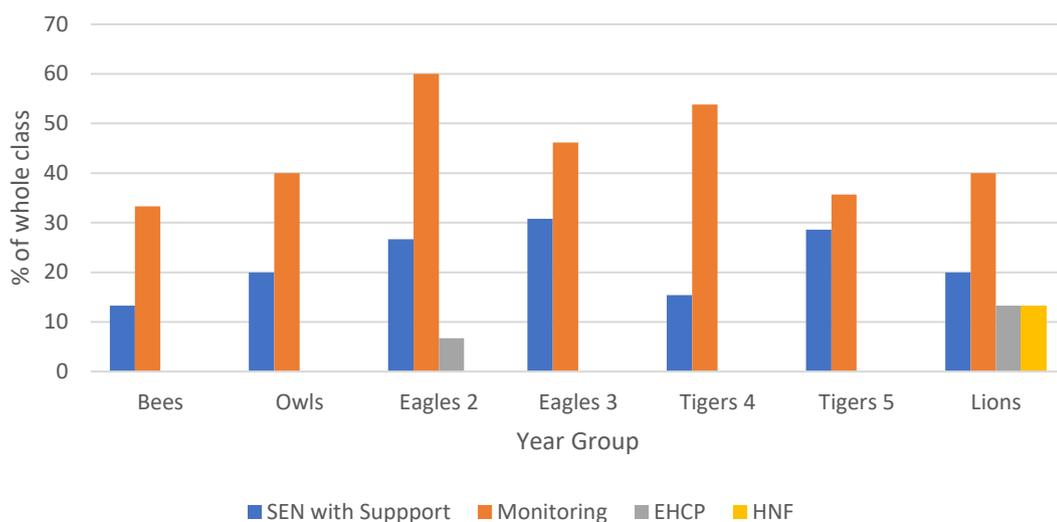
Please note only primary area of need was reported here for direct comparison purposes to national data. The school recognises several of our children have more than one area of need.

Vulnerable Groups and Additional Needs across the school

Each class has children placed at a monitoring level, who may also need support or have a specific diagnosis. Children at monitoring level will have their needs provided for through Quality First Teaching strategies using the Mainstream Core Standards guidance from the Local Authority, Kent County Council. They may also participate in some targeted support. In the academic year 2022/23, there were 43 children at monitoring level across the school.

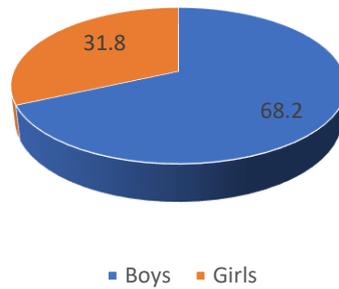

There is a majority portion of boys to girls on 'SEN with Support'. This is inline with the national picture for gender and SEN with Support.

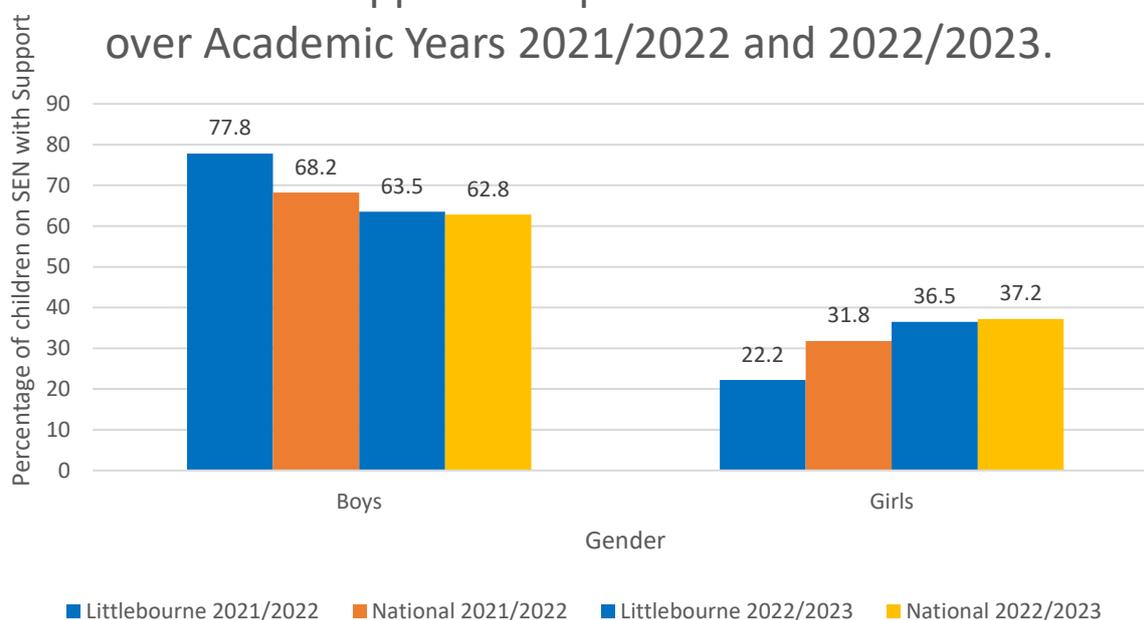

How the school's High Needs Funding is allocated and spent

In the academic year 2022/2023 the HNF budget was spent on additional adult support for the identified pupils to support their specific needs.

Pupil Premium Funding and SEN/D

Where pupils are identified as SEN with Support and also eligible for Pupil Premium Funding, some of the Pupil Premium funding has contributed to support and development of QFT strategies and implementation of the mainstream Core Standards. Time has also been allocated to participate in training related to these areas. The impact of this allocation has been identified through Learning walk and progress both academic and through review of provision.

Pupil Premium Funding and High Needs Funding

Neither of the pupils in receipt of High Needs Funding were Pupil Premium children.

Identifying pupils with SEN/D

Children are identified through a variety of in school processes including different types of assessment throughout the year, knowledge of the child and family circumstances, observations and discussions at termly Pupil Progress Meetings

Update on the School's Implementation of SEN/D Processes

SEN/D provision within the school has continued to develop in the academic year 2022/2023:

- ❖ Continued use of the Assess, Plan, Do, Review cycle
- ❖ Bespoke Class Provision Maps continue to identify interventions related to areas of need
- ❖ Bespoke Class Provision Maps continue to utilise SMART (Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Realistic, Timely) Targets and these are assessed against entry and exit data
- ❖ Termly Pupil Progress Review Meetings occur with Headteacher, SENCO and class teachers to discuss the progress of children and any concerns. The focus of the children varies termly but could include all children, Pupil Premium children and other specific groups. At every meeting children identified as 'SEN with Support' are discussed.

External Agencies Support Academic Year 2022/2023

Canterbury Specialist Teaching and Learning Service (STLS)

- ❖ 5 children were being supported by Canterbury Specialist Teaching and Learning Service (STLS). 3 children were being supported under Communication & Interaction, 2 children were being supported under Cognition & Learning. 1 child was already being supported by EYSTLS before joining Reception in September 2022.
- ❖ 2 of the children being supported by STLS left to pursue their secondary phase of education in July 2023.
- ❖ 3 children were discharged from the service of STLS/EYSTLS throughout the academic year following progress and appropriate support implementation.
- ❖ 2 children were taken to LIFT for discussion in May 2023. These two children were allocated to STLS under the area of Cognition & Learning.
- ❖ No children due to start Reception in September 2023 were already under EYFS STLS.

External Support

Canterbury Christian Schools' Work Trust (CCSWT)

- ❖ External services continued to support children through Canterbury Christian Schools' Work Trust (CCSWT) who came into school and ran different events and groups throughout the year.
- ❖ These consisted of Confident Kids (6 children), Believe in Yourself (6 children), Be Unique (5 Year 6 girls), Christmas Payer and Wellbeing Pop-up (KS2 children) and 6-to-7 Transition session (15 children).

- ❖ The impact of this support was positive and enable children to experience targeted support for different areas. The children enjoyed these sessions and feedback included:

"I learned what to do when things are going wrong"(Confident Kids participant)

"I'm a confident Kid" (Confident Kids participant)

"I am special and unique!" (Confident Kids participant)

"It's boosted my confidence" (Believe in Yourself participant)

"The poem we read has really helped me and I've been reading it at home" (Be Unique participant)

"I've learned to love that I'm unique" (Be Unique participant)

"They have been amazing to have in the group"

"They have engaged, communicated and supported one another".

- ❖ 1 child received support in school from Speech and Language Services throughout term 3 and 4, including specific transition sessions throughout term 6.

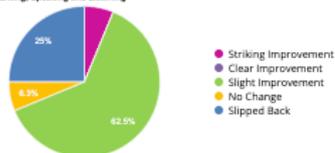
Speech Bubbles - Trinity Theatre

- ❖ 16 children from Years 1 and 2 participated in the Speech Bubbles programme through Terms 2 and 3. Of these children 5 (31%) were identified on SEN with Support.
- ❖ The impact report below identifies that all children including those identified as on SEN with Support made progress in the areas of emotional behavior and conduct skills measured before the start and at the end of the programme.
- ❖ Progress was identified in speaking and listening skills, reading and writing skills when measured before and after attendance at Speech Bubbles.

Speech Bubbles Impact Report 2022-2023 Littlebourne Primary School

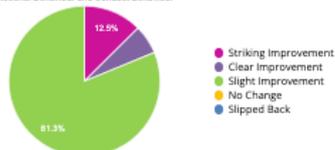
Teacher assessments showed that **69%** of pupils involved in Speech Bubbles improved their learning, speaking and listening skills this year.

Emotional Behaviour and Conduct Behaviour



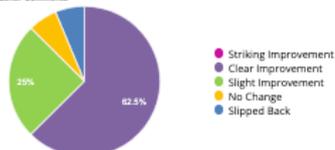

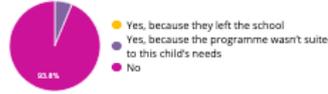
